# **Effects of Domestic Violence on Children**

Studies suggest that each year up to 10 million children witness some form of domestic violence. One in ten domestic violence calls to the police are placed by a child. A child may witness the family pet also being abused. Toys are damaged or lost. School is disrupted by multiple moves to escape the abuser.

Children react to the stress of a violent home in different ways depending upon the child's gender, age, temperament, and the types of supports the child may or may not have. The trauma of witnessing family violence effects a child's development and can continue into adulthood. Children are more at risk of abuse, and child neglect may result because the parents are too focused on themselves. Other potential effects include the following:

#### **Emotional:**

- Grief and loss issues
- Shame, guilt and self-blame
- Agitation/anxiety and the feeling that they need to be perfect
- Depression and feelings of helplessness
- Anger and hostility
- Confusion or ambivalence about parents
- Fear of abandonment or separation from the abused parent
- Embarrassment/shyness
- Helplessness
- Damaged self-esteem
- Phobias

#### Social:

- Isolation and not having friends over
- Stall coming home from school may prefer to live on the streets
- Excessive extra-curricular activities to avoid home
- Dating violence
- Early marriage
- Inappropriate sexual behavior/unplanned pregnancies
- Violence is first choice to resolve conflict with others
- Not going to school to protect abused parent

#### **Behavioral:**

- Passive withdrawing
- Lying to avoid confrontation
- Destructive behaviors toward others, objects, or pets
- Older children may start to abuse the abused parent
- Regressive behaviors such as bed-wetting, thumb-sucking, rocking, not speaking, or demanding to be carried
- Developing an interest in protection and guns or other weapons
- Becoming over-protective of abused parent
- Being overly eager to please vulnerable to exploitation by others

#### **Physical:**

- Somatic complaints, headaches, stomach aches, hives
- Accidents due to being tired, inattentive
- Increased high-risk play resulting in injuries
- Sleep disturbances too much or too little
- Poor hygiene
- Eating disorders
- Self-harm behaviors

Not only has Amy moved into a position at the Shelter, her peers voted her Employee of the Year for her positive attitude and hard work ethic.




# Indiana American Water Donation
